New aviation technology occupies the news this week – with a focus on the <u>UAV</u> <u>sector</u> as the new <u>CAA regulations</u> are about to come into force and the introduction of digital clearances

A key issue for industry – is that technology should make things better – it should improve safety, efficiency and save costs. If it doesn't do those things – what's the point?

Whilst we see some progress - we are also concerned that key opportunities are being missed. For example, within CAA we see many opportunities for automation to drive efficiencies and also improve the integrity, robustness and functionality of the system – the area of licensing being an obvious example. Despite more than a year of discussions with the CAA on this topic through ACAG and the AMCLG – there is no substantive progress. Why? Surely the CAA Funding Review should be an obvious trigger to drive efficiencies and reduce the overall costs of the CAA system – but this doesn't appear to be happening. Why not?

We will be discussing this with the Director and through ACAG in the next few weeks.

Here at Aviation NZ we are also walking the talk – and focusing on automation to improve efficiency, reduce costs – and improve our services to you our members. We are beginning with upgrading our website – to make it much more modern and accessible so you can find what you want as smoothly as possible. A big thanks to Aaron Shipman from Module for his expertise and help in making this happen.
